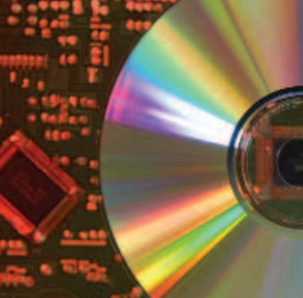

However, there is no room for complacency and the Government will continue to introduce improved systems where deficiencies are suspected which could pose a threat to Australia and its people.

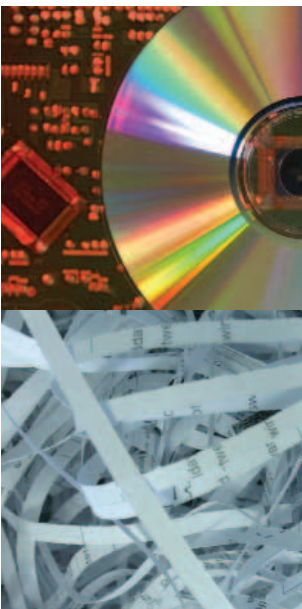

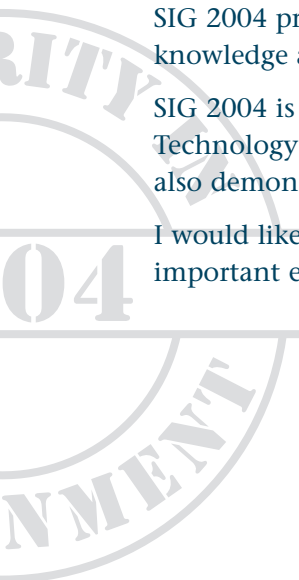
Invitation to attend the Security in Government Conference 2004 from The Hon Philip Ruddock MP, Attorney-General

I would like to extend an invitation to you to be a part of what is guaranteed to be an important event at the National Convention Centre in Canberra.



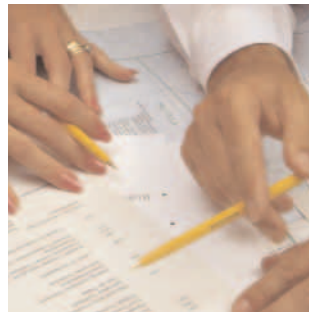


Who should attend?
